Trail Walk and Annual Meeting Sunday May 2, 2010

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Our 65th Annual Meeting will take place at 4:00 p.m., at the Weston Scout House on School Street, across from the Weston Public Library. You can park in front of the Scout House or in the Library parking lot (at the back, please, to leave room for the normal library patrons).

At 2:00 p.m. prior to the Meeting our usual Sunday guided walk will take place, led by Paul Arkema with the support of Pam Fox, President of the Weston Historical Society. It will cover the historic Sears Land where some of the sites relate to Weston's very interesting industrial period.

The meeting point is at the Church Street Railroad Station, where ample parking is available. Kids and dogs are welcome, but the latter should be leashed.

Refreshments will be served at the Scout House afterwards, as part of the Annual Meeting.

The brief business meeting will be followed by a slide presentation by Dr. John M. Hagan, President

The title of of the lecture will be:

Being an Honest Broker of Conservation Science: How Manomet Does Its Work



In an age of polarization, sound bites, and a fire-hose of 24/7 internet information, where can we get unbiased information so we can all make informed decisions? Is climate change real or not? Is it caused by humans or not? Should Massachusetts use its forests for energy? What would you need to know to answer these tough questions, and where would you get that information?

Manomet is a 40-year old science-based organization (www.manomet.org). It exists to provide people with accurate, unbiased information so they themselves can make informed decisions in the context of their own values, especially in relation to natural resource issues and sustainability. John Hagan will discuss some of the difficult issues Manomet is working on (climate change, alternative energy, maintaining clean water, and using the free market to protect environmental values essential to human well-being), and how it tackles these complex problems by restoring trust at the local community level on up.

More about John M. Hagan, Ph.D. President, Manomet Center for Conservation Sciences

In 2008, John Hagan took the helm as Manomet's third President in its 40-year history. John began his career at Manomet in 1986, when he joined the Landbird Program as a Senior Scientist. He led the analysis of Manomet's long-term bird banding dataset and organized Manomet's landmark symposium on Neotropical (John M. Hagen, continued next page...)

migratory bird conservation in Woods Hole in 1989. He edited the award-winning symposium volume published by Smithsonian Press.

John went on to establish Manomet's Forest Conservation Program, based in Brunswick, Maine, in 1997. He led a variety of field studies on forestry and biodiversity in the region, and helped transform how the forestry sector thinks about protecting biodiversity. He has worked closely with both timber companies and environmental groups, and is respected as an impartial source of information as well as a neutral convener of diverse interests. With a series of grants from the National Commission on Science for Sustainable Forestry, he helped develop a simple, science-based approach to selecting sustainability indicators that include society's economic, social, and environmental values.

John served as editor of Ornithological Monographs for the American Ornithologists' Union (AOU) from 1993-1998. He is an Elected Member of the AOU and has served on the AOU Council. He is currently on the Forest Research Advisory Council to the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture. In 2007 he received the *Austin Wilkins Forest Steward-ship Award* from Maine Governor John Baldacci. In 2009 he received the New England Society of American Foresters' *Integrity in Science Award* for his work to conserve natural resources in the Northeast.

John received a B.S. in Environmental Science from Texas Christian University, an M.S. in Wildlife Management from North Carolina State University, and a Ph.D. in Zoology, also from N.C. State. He lives on Georgetown Island, Maine, and maintains offices in both Brunswick, Maine and at Manomet's headquarters in Massachusetts.

The average market value of the Fund in 2009 not including contributions received during the year was \$790,855.86. The Cost of Living Index for all Urban Consumers in the Boston Area increased 1.8% during the year ended November 2009. 1.8% of \$790,855.86 is \$14,235.41. Real income from the Fund in 2009 is calculated as follows:

Income and Capital Gains \$ 128,080.11
Less inflation adjustment (14,235.41)

Real Income or (loss) \$ 113,844.70

\$113,844.70 is 14.40% of the average market value of the Fund in 2009. The average real rate of return on the Fund starting in 1989 is 2.75%.
